Many thanks for your Freedom of Information request received on 28th August 2013 regarding animal testing within the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine. Please find below the response to your enquiry.

Please can you provide the following information?

1) Does your institution carry out experimentation on animals?

I can confirm that Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine (LSTM) does undertake experimentation on animals.

2) If yes, what type of animals? (i.e. please provide a list of those which were involved in experimentation between 2009 and 2013)

The only overnight animal holding facility of the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine is our herpetarium, which currently houses 160 specimens of 26 different species of venomous snakes. This is a Home Office accredited and inspected facility. Venom is routinely extracted from the snakes and provided for (i) antivenom production to treat snakebite victims in Africa and (ii) for research to improve snakebite treatment. Venom extraction is a harmless procedure and conducted by UK's foremost experts on the handling of venomous snakes. Venom extraction is not a Home Office-regulated procedure and is therefore not an experiment.

The only regulated procedure we carry out on the snakes is extraction of the venom gland to acquire venom gland transcriptomes (definition of all the genes that code for venom proteins) to provide essential information to improve snakebite treatment. This experiment, which involves the death of the snake, was performed as follows:

2010 - 0

2009 - 8
